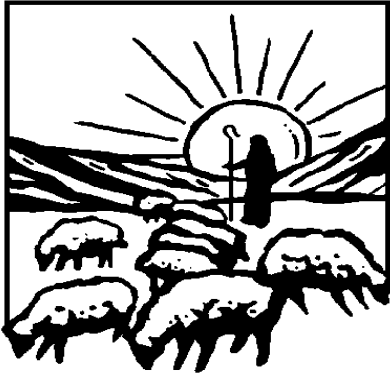

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## Katrina-impact Grows

Greetings from Week of Compassion (WOC). First, many thanks for the scores upon scores of emails and phone calls WOC is receiving from Disciples pastors and members all across the church in response to the horrific catastrophe in Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. This catastrophe may well be the worst disaster of its kind this nation has ever faced. And I do not say that casually or without regard to other major disasters in our nation's history.

Normally, the relief operation would be well underway; instead, we are still in a search and rescue mode. New Orleans is now being evacuated, and some 80% of the city is flooded. The Gulf Coast area of Mississippi has simply

been obliterated. The normal network of local churches and partners through whom WOC usually works has been seriously disrupted. Phone lines and cell towers are down. Basic infrastructure systems (roads, bridges, utility lines) have been heavily damaged - which means it is extremely difficult to get in touch with our pastors and congregations in the impacted areas.

The people along the Gulf Coast will need our help for years to come. For sure, we will have a number of church facilities damaged, perhaps even destroyed, and many of our families will be homeless. And as always, you can be certain that 100% of your designated offerings will be used for hurricane relief and recovery. There will be a time when

volunteer work groups are needed. But that time has not come. Remember that the wrong kind of donations create a second disaster!

A growing number of Disciples congregations in some of the surrounding states are finding opportunities to assist local housing and feeding efforts for the growing number of Katrina refugees.

Finally and most importantly - we ask your prayers for the survivors, the first responders and others working to stabilize the situation, people who haven't heard from their families since Katrina struck, and all those whose lives have been indelibly affected.

## THE 2005 GENERAL ASSEMBLY BRINGS THOUSANDS TO PORTLAND, OREGON



The 2005 General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) involved worship, praise, and miraculous mission work. A new General Minister and President was elected and major changes to the Design were approved. Resolutions on a number of issues were debated and approved during business portions of the assembly, including several on international issues, as well as a plan that will enable the continuation of healthcare coverage for ministers and other church employees.

Approximately 5200 people attended the July 23-27 Assembly at the Oregon Convention Center in Portland, Ore. Registrants participated in worship services, exhibits, resource workshops, mission outreach and a host of dinners, and receptions. There were also lots of opportunities to fellowship with new and old friends, and take part in several pre-registration events. The host area -- which included the Oregon and Northwest regions -- registered 1181 persons, above their stated goal of 1175 people. Nearly 2,000 ordained and licensed clergy attended the assembly, as well as 3,209 registered representatives.

One highlight was the election of the Rev. Dr. Sharon E. Watkins as the seventh General Minister and President. She succeeds Rev. Dr. Wm. Chris Hobgood, who served a nearly two-year term. Watkins has been Senior Minister of Disciples Christian Church in Bartlesville, Okla. for the past eight years. She was formally installed during the closing worship service on Wednesday, July 27. She will now work from the denomination's general offices in Indianapolis, Ind.

The assembly also voted overwhelmingly to revise the Design of the church, placing local congregations in the forefront of the church's guiding document. The revised Design spells out the duties of the church's general minister and president and changes the membership of key boards and committees. Approval of the emergency resolution on health care means a restructuring of the program for 2006 and the launching of a capital campaign to raise reserve funds to assure its financial strength in the coming years.

Mission work at the assembly was particularly impressive. Approximately 5,110 people of all ages volunteered for mission

work during the assembly. About 4,200 people helped prepare quilts or tie knots in 124 "quilts of hope" which will be delivered across the country to almost every region to keep people in need warm. One in five of those quilts will be given to homeless agencies in the Portland area.

Over 400 people also worked in the Portland community at public schools, a warehouse, an emergency food ministry, and at a Disciples church. About 256 people gave 186 pints of blood during the blood drive.

"Our mission work was a chance to tell the Portland community that we are a denomination that cares about justice and about being involved in the community in which we worship," said Jayna Powell, of Volunteers in Mission, a part of Disciples Home Missions. "That's what it means to be a Disciple."

## Sunday School Classes

This year we have Sunday School curriculum for all ages as we have set a goal for involving everyone in the church – **100% participation.**

If you are a parent, watch out, your child is going to WANT TO COME each Sunday morning!

### Nursery

We provide quality nursery care and have three caregivers each Sunday. We have one room set aside for infants only. The second room (which is adjoined) provides space for toddlers and pre-schoolers. Our caregivers are prepared to greet our youngest church members and guests each and

### Pre-School

This class is for 2 year olds (when their parents think they are ready) through kindergarteners. We use a hands-on, active learning program, and learn a different Bible story each week.

### Elementary

This class is for 1<sup>st</sup> graders through 5<sup>th</sup> graders. The curriculum is again active learning, using a variety of learning styles through rotation workshop. The first month, September, we will "Dig into the Bible" and work on learning the books of the Bible, where the Bible

came from, and more! Each month will have a different theme and we may watch a movie, or make something in the kitchen, or have a drama, or *who knows?*

### Youth

This is the class that you never know what might be happening each Sunday. Eric Elder is an experienced youth leader and Bible teacher. This group will be learning "little known Biblical facts", watching movie clips, and maybe even taking morning treks to IHOP! Don't miss a Sunday!

### Adult

This year we offer your choice between two classes:

### Bible Thumpers

Rev. Lanier continues to offer a Bible Study class, using resources such as *Bible for Dummies* or choosing a particular book in the Book to study verse by verse.

### What's Next? Class

Rev. Elder is starting a class geared for those with young families, but open to all adults. In this class we will study everything from *Who We are as Disciples* to *Parenting to Bible Study on Marriage Relationships*. This class, in general, will have a four-week format, so that anyone may attend for a particular topic of interest.

We want to remind each person and family that being in Sunday School and Worship is a choice each week. One member said, "We have made a decision for ourselves, if we're in town we're in church.

SHCC have adopted that

## Gloria's Europe Trip

As told by our pianist, Gloria Young Kim

Hello all! I am finally back from my Europe trip. It is nice to be back to familiar territory, but it was fun playing explorer and being lost.

For those who had no idea where I went, I went to Europe to do a small tour (funded by UT) playing piano, organ and violin, both solo and chamber. I also went to a program, the Austrian American Mozart Academy, to be one of the rehearsal pianists.

I first flew into Amsterdam on July 6, did a chamber music recital with a bassoon and clarinet. We had a short reception and then I had to leave to Salzburg and I did another concert (organ and a Metropolitan Opera tenor) in Bad Ischl on July 9. I did a concert on piano later that day in some fancy restaurant on the Ischl river.

I went back on Sunday to go up the Teufelsaube (devil's thumb). It looked too risky to resist climbing it (pretty much vertical).

I started rehearsals on Monday 11<sup>th</sup>-Friday 15<sup>th</sup>. A typical rehearsal day started out with playing lessons in the morning (9am-1220pm), break from 12ish-2, and then 2-6 opera rehearsal. The 2-6 would not have been so bad except the group I was assigned to was doing Mozart's *Così fan tutte* (meaning a REALLY LONG OPERA/ TORTURE FOR PIANISTS). The other thing was that we had three casts (EVEN

LONGER). Even more impossible, we were going to perform WITH ORCHESTRA (me on timpani, and "harpsichord") in THREE WEEKS. I got Thursday mornings off, and weekends (except when I have to perform).

The next week I discovered that their public pools are metal. It was nice because you don't rip your feet up on the bottom on the swimming pool. I also climbed up Moenchsberg where the Fortress is. It took me a while to figure out how to get up there because I didn't want to take the lift. Once up there, I felt sorry for the kids who had to hike up the whole thing. They were all drenched in sweat; barely had their eyes opened, and were sprawled all over one area. Everyone was trying to catch their breath because it is about 1800 feet higher than the city (which is already 1476 feet above sea level).

I saw other things; Mozart's father's grave, Constanze, Wolf Dietrich's, Doppler, many cathedrals, Nonnberg Abbey, the Stieglbrau (beer), stinky horse poo, yummy greasy unhealthy food, pretty cars and motorcycles. I got to play on the organ in the Dom (same organ Mozart played on.) The Maestro knew the organist there (who is some 80+ year old genius that improvises many-voice fugues). On July 30, I played another solo recital in Zurich for rich people (salon

concert?). They were nice.

I managed to get a hold of the new Harry Potter book and spent all Sunday reading it. Monday I asked for the day off, went to Wolfgangsee and rented a boat with some friends. I saw nice sailboats and went water skiing (I'm not that good), and watched other people do crazy tricks on the jet skis and water skis. I climbed another mountain that shot out vertically from the lake. When you fall, you land in the lake so it is not so bad (as long as you remember to kick AWAY from it). It is hard to swim back to the boat because of the strong current. The weather also started to get really cold. I think it was 50 degrees Fahrenheit, and the wind made it worse. So did the occasional rain. Then I had ringing in my ears, which I normally do (really high pitched) but these were lower pitches and one was out of tune. It went away when the weather started warming and the rains lessened.

The Mozart performances went fine (Friday and Saturday). I planned on traveling around Europe my remaining week there, but was told that I had to play for the next opera, Strauss' *Zigeunerbaron*. So I sight-read the entire opera on Monday with orchestra (they didn't have a copy for me until then). On Wednesday I played with three other people on a borrowed violin (two Beethoven quartets) at a smaller church in Munich for an evening concert.

On Thursday, I went to Munich, but to enjoy the sights (Olympic grounds, BMW museum, other museums, Hofbraeuhaus, churches, Rathaus area, etc). I had to go back to Salzburg for a 730pm dress rehearsal. Friday and Saturday were the *Zigeunerbaron* performances. After both performances, I met the two countesses from Mirabell who offered to pay my education if I went to the Royal College of Music, or Royal Academy of Music (both in England).

I also met a professor from RCM who wanted me to play in her studio as a studio accompanist. I met faculty/staff from Eastman and New England Conservatory, Mozarteum, and Sylvia Stone from Illinois Urbana-Champaign. All told me about the school and their programs. I also met Anna Netrebko, Thomas Hampson, and Rolando Villazon (singers). Oh and Grace Bumbry (Met opera).

I sounded funny the first couple days back because I tend to learn languages by ear and imitated the Austrian accent to the point that I even spoke English with an accent. But I watched enough American television to get my own accent back. The weather here is ok. I have weird allergies all of a sudden, and I missed my dog and cat.
